Successes

- OUTspoken: Leaving the Second Closet Behind
- An LGBTQ* survivor speak out, resource fair and performance by Mary Lambert
- Put together with both campus and community organizations
- Sponsored by private donations, LGBTQ* campus organizations, and UK's Student Government

Challenges

- Finding faculty and staff support
- Finding administration support
- Two extremely stigmatized groups in Kentucky (LGBTQ* and survivors of violence)

Advice

- Be willing to meet your population where they are at
- Be willing to postpone programs until word of mouth gets out, and general discussion about violence in the LGBTQ* community starts among students.
- DON'T GIVE UP!

Success: Greater exposure Challenge: Administration pushback

Advice:

Reach out to organizations that are doing similar work, collaborate with motivated student leaders and get the support from administration.

The campaign thus far

- Success: framing and escalation of strategies
- *Challenge:* administration's dismissal of student activism
